

Bio:







Bio:

Because I believe these stories transcend any one time or location, I will often place the heroes, gods and monsters of these stories in environments far from their origins. In placing the supernatural in mundane places, I hope to breathe life into these ancient tales by eliciting an unsettled reaction from the viewer. Sometimes people perceive the work far differently than my original intention. I often find their interpretations very illuminating. For once a painting is completed, res ipsa loquitur (the thing speaks for itself).

Bio:

In a series of paintings, I decided to examine Black Movement by juxtaposing dance, symbolisms, colors, and subtle but prominent imagery to speak on the dynamic of the past, the present, and the future of different movements that have happened over the years.

"Time" & "Movement" have always created "The Bridge" from one generation of black movement to the next. All of these works are the basis of a larger body of work, titled The Black Scrolls. These works examine bigger themes such as Time, and what that means in terms of balancing on the shoulders of our forefathers to more specific events and their recurrence over the years. One such event is the March on Washington August 1963 and March on Washington in 2020 which is seen subtly demonstrated in the "Movement" piece. "The Bridge" juxtaposes symbols that show the peaceful motives but harsh realities of many civil rights movements over the years.

Black & Blackness have always been associated with negativity but I want to redefine that connotation through my work. Hence the work embraces blackness literally and symbolically, black movements, and black resiliency.
